DON'T DREAD OLD BREAD

It's so old-fashioned that you'd think everyone knew about it, or, had forgotten it. It's stale bread rejuvenated by making bread pudding out of it. A bit like French toast which in France they call "lost bread" it involves soaking bread in a milk & egg mix then cooking it. French toast is so simple. Soak, then fry. A standard for Bryan Smith's Sundays. Bread puddings are similarly simple, soak, then bake. They can be savoury or sweet, main course or dessert. For a main course



version think about adding some vegetables, bacon or ham to it. For a dessert version, add some cinnamon and/or vanilla, along with fruit. Make it with white bread, brioche or even stale donuts. How sweet it is. And by the way, with food prices the way they are today, they can save you money too, not just the price of bread but the other bits found in the fridge you rescue by adding them. Check out recipes for bread pudding on the web. You will find lots. Grandma would have known how, but you can make these warming dishes yourself.

THE GREATS OF ZORRA

The Beachville District Historical Society's Zorra Heritage Committee is currently compiling the stories of historic individuals, connected to Zorra, who gained recognition for their contributions beyond the Township's borders. To date, 78 individuals have been identified as part of the committee's Greats of Zorra project, and additional suggestions are always welcome. The Zorra Heritage Committee's next meeting is Wed, Feb 4, 7pm at the Beachville District Museum, 584367 Beachville Rd, Beachville. Zorra residents & non-residents alike are welcome to attend. As part of the Greats of Zorra project, the Zorra Heritage Committee has prepared the following overview of Jacob D. Allen of Thamesford.

JACOB DAVID ALLEN was a notable early settler & poet in the Thamesford area of Zorra Township. Originally from Quebec, he moved to Thamesford after meeting his wife, Maria Congdon, while travelling through Upper Canada. The couple married in 1838, and that same year Allen purchased land on Lot 1, Concession 9 in East Nissouri Township. Throughout his life, Allen held a variety of occupations, including schoolteacher, shop owner, mercantile operator in Thamesford, and poet. In 1866, he published *The Musings of Uncle Jake*, a 208-page collection of poems reflecting his experiences & observations, much of it written during periods of travel. Jacob D. Allen died in 1874 while living in St. Marys. His legacy remains visible in Thamesford through Allen Street, which was renamed from St. Patrick's Street following his purchase of land & construction of a general store on the west bank of the Thames River, north of Dundas Street. In recognition of his positive impact on the community, Allen's name was added onto the Thamesford Wall of Recognition in 2011.

HARRINGTON GRAVEL PIT UPDATE

Just last month our committee, Protect Harrington, informed you that for 14 months we'd had virtually no response to the objection letters submitted by area residents to the MNR. We poured out our complaints & concerns to the MNR back in Nov 2024 – the expected noise, the dust, the traffic, the damage to our groundwater, the impact on our property values & to our overall quality of life. It was a long time to sit here waiting for a response, but the new year finally delivered at least 10 letters of response, including a major response to our committee, from the consultants engaged in getting a gravel pit up & running in Harrington. And guess what, they say, the noise, dust, traffic, etc. won't be so bad. Impact on your groundwater? Not at all. And impact on your property values? That's not even worth looking at, because they have a study that says property values aren't affected, and even if they are, the Province says they're allowed to impact your property values without providing compensation. Meanwhile, MPAC accepts proximity to a gravel pit as justification for appealing an assessed property value. Says the Province, if your property is worth less because it's beside a gravel pit, well, we can't deny it, but tough. One of the most egregious determinations by the Province is that our groundwater won't be affected in Harrington. There was a hydrogeological study submitted by the gravel pit applicant which claims that, not to worry, your water will be fine. Perhaps they didn't know that a renowned hydrogeologist, Dr. Larry Jensen, grew up here in Harrington & lives across from the pit site. We submitted what's known as a "hydrogeological peer review", where Larry countered the consultant's report with the actual facts of our "significant water recharge area", as UTRCA describes us. The Province has essentially repudiated our local expert's vast knowledge & experience and accepted wholesale the opinion of someone else. This is typical of Provincial procedure – find someone with credentials who'll write a report that supports a gravel pit, and dismiss anyone else who disagrees. Gravel is king. Protect Harrington, and the many individuals willing to fight to preserve our community, will continue to use all rational argument & legitimate resistance to save our community. Strangely, the consultants' response to our objection letters all ended with this, "If we have satisfied your concerns, we would appreciate receiving a brief letter stating that you no longer object to the application." Fat chance!!
